You can also fish for speckled trout in the Maricourt and Fremin rivers. A magnificent waterway that is unspoiled and breathtaking to discover. This exceptional fishing area, with rapids worthy of the most daring adventurers and shorelines that provide the setting for memorable shore lunches to experience an unforgettable fishing adventure.

The Atlantic salmon in the river migrate to the Koksoak River in the Ungava Bay estuary to spaded. The fishing season on the Delay River runs from July to September, fishing can be practiced from the shoreline on foot or by boat. You can practice fly fishing or casting during authorized period. You will be surprised by the exceptional strength of the salmon and the battle they will wage with you.

According to a recent study conducted by a group of biologists, the Delay River has the highest success rate for Atlantic salmon fishing in the province of Quebec. The average catch per fisherman is two (2) salmon per day, with an average weight of 6 to 12 pounds and the largest weighing 20 lbs.

The Delay River area is very productive for caribou hunting from mid-August to the end of September.

This area puts you at the crossroads of caribou migration and provides you higher success rate than the average hunting results of the industry. However, some years hunting may be more difficult. Caribou migration is closely linked to a number of factors beyond our control: climate, weather occurrences, the lack of flies, the availability of food, forest fires etc.

The caribou hunting success rate still remains quite high for big game. Despite our good intentions, we cannot guarantee your results nor relocate our clients to other areas.

Caribou are among the largest herds of wild animals in the world. Biologists believe that there are between 700,000 and 1,000,000 across the entire northern region of Quebec. Herd's ranges in size from a few animals to several thousand and they continually move from one seasonal feeding ground to another, travelling distances of up to 1,300 kilometres. Migration factors are complex: vegetation growth, weather conditions, animal mating and birthing, and the destruction of their food supply areas as the result of forest fires. Moss is the staple of their diet and often plays a leading role in the animals' movements. The large herds assemble three times during the year: at the end of winter for the spring migration, immediately after the females give birth, and for the fall migration. Apart from these large gatherings, small groups of caribou can be found scattered across the entire Northern region.

You are allowed to catch two caribou. Hunting is done on foot and sometimes the use of boats is needed to travel throughout the area. You can hunt with a rifle, black powder or a bow and arrow.

Suggested calibre rifles:

We recommend using 243, 308, 30.06, 270 and 300 calibre rifles, with a 150-grain round as well as a telescope that can be adjusted to 200 yards. Hunting bows should have a minimum tension of 40 lbs. and the tips of the arrows should be very sharp.

Tips n' trick for hunters:

Caribou rely almost entirely on their sense of smell to detect danger; a hunter who is trying to get close to the animal should therefore move against the wind. Although they have an excellent sense of hearing, caribou do not usually pay attention to rustling and whispering. A caribou does not have keen eyesight but will quickly notice any suspicious movement. A hunter can often succeed in getting close to the animal by crawling into the wind and moving forward only when the caribou is looking the other way. You must stop moving as soon as the caribou turns towards you. When its start to run away, it will not usually go very far; it will stop to look back since it is a very curious animal. Caribou are always on the move and although they may appear to be slow-moving from a distance, many hunters have been surprised at how quickly they move.

In addition to hunting for caribou, during authorized periods you can also hunt for black bears and ptarmigan.

Getting ready for your trip

Before leaving for your excursion, be sure to pack the following items:

- Fishing rods and fishing gear
- (flies, lures, fishing line, etc.) • Rifle or bow (ammunition, arrows, etc.)
- Raincoat and windbreaker
- Rubber boots
- Caps or fishing hat
- Woollen socks
- Pants
- Warm underwear
- Warm hunting coat
- T-shirts and heavy sweaters
- (example: turtlenecks)

- Running shoes Flashlight and batteries
- Sunglasses (polarized)
- Sunscreen (skin and lips)
- Lighter or matches
- Insect repellent with DEET
- Camera or video camera
- Sleeping bag
